#### Dear Friends,

Last week wasn't the best for many people, realising that this is indeed 'a marathon, not a sprint'. We are not all marathon runners! #### **Lead theft – Progress!**

Out of the blue this morning (Wednesday April 29th) I was approached for a statement about the lead theft from Gamlingay Church 18 months ago. A PC from the Rural Crimes Action Team (RCAT) in our area took my statement and told me some interesting information on the crime. I know no one here is going to use it but I won't share everything that has led to present developments. However, you will be pleased to know that our local RCAT team (covering a huge area from northern Peterborough down to the Essex border) is working with the Lincolnshire police who have been able to tie the theft at our church to recent crimes in their area. There is someone on remand in Lincolnshire for lead theft from churches, and good reason to hope that our theft, by the same people who stole from Offord, but NOT those who stole from Gransden, (both sets of crimes perpetrated by two different Romanian gangs) will be pinned down to that individual.

#### **ZOOM** by Alec Hissett

I expect, like me, many of you had not heard of Zoom before the lockdown. It has been a very useful means of communicating with our church community, family and friends. If you have not yet used it and have a computer, tablet or smart phone it is well worth giving it a try. Most of the church services since Holy Week have been available via the Zoom application and this is likely to continue until we are allowed to return to our church buildings, and maybe beyond.

If you are receiving the regular updates from Hilary you will have seen the link to each service, if not and you would like to join in then please send an email to:

you will then receive the necessary internet link along with a Meeting Id, Password and the time of the service.

Once logged in you will be prompted to switch on your device camera and microphone, this will allow you to be seen and heard by others attending. To turn off either of these functions you will see the option on the on-screen menu. Once you have joined it is good to see who else is "attending the service". Depending on the device you are using you will be able to select the GALLERY view from the on-screen menu this will display a small picture of each person (sitting in the comfort of their homes). The number of people displayed will depend on your device, to see more people swipe left or right.

This is a very brief overview of the Zoom application and I encourage you to give it a try!

We await further information but there is a possibility, if there is a further conviction, that assets may be reclaimed and, if so, that we might get something back. Whatever the case, I would like to pay tribute to the painstaking gathering and keeping of evidence that RCAT has accomplished, and to thank again the resident on St Mary's who called the police out on the night of Oct 25th 2018, leading to some of the evidence collection which is now proving useful. The Police get a lot of criticism, some of it deserved, but not in this case.

We are all, to some extent, 'full of care' but many of us also find ourselves with more 'staring time' and what a wealth of treats nature has been providing over the last few weeks! Whether you are restricted to your own garden or able to venture further afield for your daily exercise there has been so much to delight the eye.

Those who have made it up to Gamlingay wood will know that the bluebells this year have been stunning. They are now almost over but there is still plenty to see. The ground is studded with bright yellow celandine and twinkling forget-me-nots; there are small clumps of wood anemone and a scattering of delicate violets; look out for the creamy yellow flowers of the dead nettle and white clouds of blossom on the blackthorn. But, best of all (as far as David is concerned!) the early purple orchids have finally decided to flaunt themselves and where we had been searching in vain they are suddenly abundant and well worth a minute or two of staring time.

In Millbrook Meadows the cowslips have been wonderful and have you spotted the clump of kingcups down beside the brook and maybe the odd water vole splashing about?

The weather is changing now (and we do need the rain) but the unpolluted sky has been a brilliant blue. The warm sunshine has been encouraging butterflies to take to the wing and everyone is remarking on the bird song which seems so much more noticeable than usual. Maybe they too are happier with less pollution in the atmosphere or could it possibly be something to do with people keeping their cats in? On the subject of birds, David has been rather disturbed at the perceived lack of swallows which he feels should be far more evident at this time of year. If you see any please let us know – perhaps we can keep a tally. And do watch out for the swifts at the beginning of May as they make their annual return to established nests at The Emplins and surrounding area.

Take time to 'stop and stare' this week, it is very good for the soul! Perhaps, for next week's newsletter, someone would like to tell us what they have observed in their own garden or allotment?
