

Fresh off the press is news that adjustments are being made to 'church-in-lockdown' instructions. Do not get too excited though. There is little chance of changes occurring soon for public shared worship. Despite what you may have heard in the National Press, we are still not allowed to conduct funeral services in church. The changes do however allow the incumbent, or a designated other, to visit church on a daily basis to say the office, so watch this space for how we will be organising ourselves over the next few weeks. It is likely to be some time before there is any permission for worship inside churches but let us hope there will soon be the opportunity for outside services.

### **More Progress News – Alarm for the Roof**

It always makes me smile when I see a sign saying 'This roof is alarmed'. 'What has frightened it?' I am tempted to ask. Our roof has had no such worries, the worry has all been with the PCC. 7. They all have 28 days.





### The Guild of St Mary's Scarecrow

*A plea from Melissa Scuse at Everton:*

**Interested in becoming an Everton sidesperson?**

There are a large number of people that help to run a church, and as a new member of the Everton PCC, I've been able to see how everyone from Revd Hilary to the PCC and all our volunteers work hard to ensure that services run smoothly and the mission of St. Mary's is promoted across our community. I know that I wish I had more time to support the church, and one role you might not have already considered is becoming a sidesperson.

**What is a sidesperson?**

A sidesperson is primarily responsible for helping the church warden before, during and after services. Tasks include greeting members of the congregation, handing out hymn books and service sheets, and taking the collection. In Everton, Jonathan Kirkham kindly oversees a rota based on people's availability, with no minimum commitment to a specific number of Sundays. While we cannot be physically present in church at the moment it would be brilliant to add a few more people to our sidesperson rota.

There are also various other duties that you might like to consider volunteering for including organ playing, altar preparation and reading.
