Dear People,

On Monday the PCCs approved the preparations for the opening of our churches for private prayer so, by the time you read this, you will be able to go into the churches on your own. If you do, please observe the instructions and use the facilities we have provided. **Gamlingay church will be open every day from 10** a.m. to 5 p.m. For the time being, Everton church will be open from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Friday - Monday and Hatley St. George can be opened by arrangement. There will be notices in church and on social media.

We have managed to make this happen just as further, somewhat vague, announcements have been made about limited permissions for services. Please, let's be patient and encourage one another as we wait for more detail. When we have the detail it can be translated into action appropriate to our circumstances. We must recognise that we are by no means 'over' this health crisis and that we have to 'do as we are told' - which takes longer than any of us would like.

I am keen to manage expectations, as it is very unlikely that we shall be giving communion in church in the near future. This grieves me, as I know it does many of you. I know anger is part of grief so if you want to have a rant, do so - we all share in that need. But do let us also move on, use the energy generated for good and do what we can with a good grace.

I would like to pay tribute to the people who have worked with me 'behind the scenes' (Wardens and others) to make sure we are meeting our obligations as we make access to our buildings possible. These are challenging times for everyone. What a blessing the encouragers are! We all want to be back together but those of us who have to meet the guidelines and instructions (not all of which are made public) have a lot to do to make that happen - even when we do have permission.

May the God we know in Jesus Christ be with us and bless us as we journey on together. Hilary
