From Hilary:

Greetings at the start of October as we continue into Autumn with the expected resurgence of the Coronavirus. We are blessed in this place with the space and fresh air we have around us and the possibilities of staying distanced. However, no one should be (and we certainly aren't in our churches) complacent about the fact that Covid 19, as well as other viruses which we haven't taken as seriously as we should, will be around even more as the weather cools, the days shorten and the possibilities for outdoor activities reduce.

Who can attend Church? What services will be held?

At the moment, churches can allow as many people to attend a regular Sunday worship service as can be accommodated safely. Do keep watching out for changing advice and regulations. For now, we are offering an adjusted schedule of main Sunday worship for the Benefice in the two parish churches each week. This does not mean, of course, that everyone should be at church. If you have any symptoms that could be Covid 19 you should not be out, never mind in church. In addition, anyone with any symptoms of illness and anyone who is particularly vulnerable should avoid places where people congregate. This obviously includes church.

We continue to try to consider the needs of all, faced with the fact that we can't do everything or please everyone. If you are one of those to whom this applies - THANK YOU for being gracious and generous where your needs cannot be met. We will listen and explore any reasonable suggestions for how things could be adjusted but be aware there are many factors to balance. Please do be in touch if you are unable to attend church for whatever reason and we will keep you particularly in mind.

We have looked at the minimum capacities of our churches while maintaining 2m distance. We are confident of a capacity of 70 in Gamlingay (not including the choir stalls but including some areas with limited sight-lines); somewhere around 45 in Everton, including the choir area; and around 18 in Hatley. These are not exact, nor are they maximums, as the configurations and therefore capacities change if people come in family groups larger than 2. Because of the large number of possible permutations, it is impossible to say how many more could be fitted in with groups - we think in Gamlingay it could be up to 100, Everton around 55 and Hatley possibly 25. As our regular attendances on Sundays are well below these capacities, we have no worries on that score. For the special occasions, particularly Remembrance and Christmas services, we probably won't be able to do what we have done in the past, although we will still be celebrating, singing carols, and generally not being stopped by the need to make significant adjustments. God bless us all in our ongoing efforts.

This year, as we come to say 'thank you' at our Harvest Festivals in Benefice Harvest Thanksgiving Week, we are not able to do exactly as we have done in previous years. However, we are in our church buildings and all three places will be decorated for Harvest. Although this year there will not be a service in Hatley, the church will be open on the Sundays at either end of the Harvest octave and decorated for the festival. Everton's service is next Sunday. A Gift Day letter will be going round the village and ER membership this week, while Gamlingay's Harvest is incorporated into our Benefice All Age Eucharist.

Please do contribute in whichever of the following ways works for you and to whichever church in the Benefice you wish (you can contribute to more than one!). We are saying 'thank you' for 'all good gifts around us' - so much more than our food. The following are invited:

Sandra's licensing service will be on Zoom at 2.30pm on Saturday afternoon 3rd October. All are welcome, to attend - the following information is provided.

The Churchyard flowers - Philip Gorton

Everybody in Gamlingay must know of the two vast beech trees that grace the southern edge of the churchyard of St. Mary's. Some four years ago there was a footpath under them which was regularly used. The trees have now grown bigger and, as a consequence, the lowest branches now almost touch the ground.

This is a pity because for several years now we have been planting snowdrops, crocus and cyclamen under the branches. All the original plants are "spares" from our garden at The Emplins. The picture shows a small patch of the cyclamen which are now in full flower and worth a look.

Autumn cyclamen are curious things. After flowering the seed heads are set at the end of a coiled stem which uncoils itself when the seed is ripe. This action means that, given the right conditions, the mother corm can surround itself with little seedling cyclamen. Clearly, within our garden, we have the correct conditions because in



most years we have an abundance of seedlings. These are allowed to grow for about a season. After that they can go into the churchyard.

When I have a spare moment in September I try to enlarge the patch. The first thing to do is to remove the ivy which spreads along the ground. Planting could not be more easy. As I clear the leaf mould I open up small depressions into which the seedlings are planted. The final act is to simply cover the corm and leave it tidy

At the western edge of the Beech tree area there is a much larger area of Snowdrops that can be seen in the spring. This patch is easier to expand than the cyclamen patch because here we have more plants and some of the clumps in the Churchyard can be subdivided.

Not to be outdone, my wife scatters crocus seeds amongst the cleared areas. I would dearly like to eventually cover all the area with flowers as, in my opinion, this would add to the sight of this area.
