From Hilary:

This coming Sunday is the first in June, the first after Trinity Sunday and the first in 'Ordinary (ordered) time and will be a special one in spite of the name - we expect some more such 'specials' during the Summer. This week we celebrate music and musicians at both Benefice services - 9.30am in Gamlingay and 4pm in Everton, on the Sunday designated by the RSCM as Music Sunday. Augustine famously said 'the one who sings prays twice' and we celebrate the way in which we have been able to keep some 'singing together while apart' going, thanks to the technology and the people who could make it work. Music reaches parts other communication cannot, even enjoyed by the profoundly deaf, and singing is good for us, body mind and spirit, so do join in if you can. The beauty of a Zoom participation is that you can sing as loudly as you like, receiving sound so you join with others but with microphone off, so the sound works for everyone. The service in Gamlingay in the morning is an All Age communion service both in person and broadcast on Zoom. Do share if you can, we have much to be thankful for. Everton's service is a sung Evensong, with designated choir - do be in touch to be one of the 6 permitted singers. That too will be available on Zoom, with apologies that the signal can be a bit in-and-out.

Last Sunday those who could be there enjoyed an uplifting Trinity Confirmation service with Rt Reverend Dr Dagmar Winter presiding. A Bank Holiday weekend Sunday afternoon perhaps wasn't the best time and day for a large turnout, but Everton hosted a morning communion which made it possible for some who couldn't be at an



afternoon service to celebrate this last big festival of the Easter season. In the afternoon Gamlingay Church and Church Hall gardens accommodated families and supporters of the four candidates for a lovely occasion where we were able to celebrate together in more normal-feeling ways, while still taking care of one another.



Bishop Dagmar shared with us the picture reproduced here, of the Trinity. It is an image of a ceramic model in which the central figure can be seen as a human soul - which could be any of us - being ministered to and surrounded by the Trinity God. The soul is attended by the three persons of the Unity, represented here as serving humanity in perfection of love. The Spirit is a flame/dove, descending onto the central figure, so could seem a little distanced by contrast with the other persons of the Deity, who attend in intimate contact, serving and supporting the central figure. The important element is the love that is expressed among the figures The central one, the main recipient, also giving by accepting in weakness. We were asked where we see ourselves - maybe giving, maybe receiving, but all in love.





Jason, Lauren, Peter and Wayne had enjoyed 6 weeks of preparation and bible study classes to prepare for Sunday's confirmation in St Mary's, Gamlingay, and the weather was absolutely beautiful!!

Thanks to Sandra and the Sparks group families along with other wonderful helpers (Ros, Alec and Alan to name a few) the garden was looking fantastic to host a small tea party for the Bishop after the service. Everyone enjoyed sandwiches, tea and cake and even a glass of bubbly!! I am pleased to report that our funding application towards the costs of installing PV Panels on the south aisle roof has been approved and we have been advised to make a further application for the September round of funding. A further application is being prepared for the South Cambridgeshire District Council Zero Carbon Communities Grant scheme.

We are planning to have the PV panels installed at the same time as the lead roofing is replaced, later this year. Approval will be required for the installation but we are confident that this will be given as it will help achieve the Church of England's stated commitment to be carbon neutral by 2030.
