#### From Hilary...

There have already been a good few returned service consultation questionnaires but I am hoping for some more before finalising February services. Thank you to those of you who have responded and, if you haven't, it is not too late (see below).

As the season of Epiphany continues, we pray to be visible and hospitable people of God, living the Gospel in challenging times. Do make time to reflect on, and share with me, the ways in which you can be part of this amazing and mysterious Kingdom which Jesus came to reveal and show the way to.

#### 'Living Ely 2025' and Christian Unity

There was always an intention, in this year, to follow up Diocesan planning (which had started before I came here) but a lot has changed between the publishing of the Diocesan Strategy and now. Since then, Covid 19 has brought about, or been a catalyst for, all sorts of challenges and changes. Nevertheless (in fact even more so in the light of what is happening to our parishes) there is a planning initiative underway called Living Ely 2025. This was launched before Christmas by +Dagmar and other leaders in the Diocese as they toured the Deaneries speaking to the Greater Chapters (clergy in post, retired clergy with permission to officiate and LLMs). Bishop Stephen will be with the Deanery in early March as this process continues.

Three pieces of printed information have been produced with the same information in more or less detail. Church Wardens and PCCs already have theirs and the congregational version will be available in churches shortly, explaining what's going on. Please take one when they are out, then read and respond in whatever way seems right. We will be looking for a few people from across the Deanery to be part of a core planning group, but it is hoped that all church members will get involved with sharing views and offering their gifts in supporting the ministry of the parishes.

The idea is for Deaneries to plan 'bottom up', by parishes sharing needs, successes and aspirations. A group in the Deanery will draw these together to formulate plans to present to the Diocese. Diocesan staff will then bring together the results from the Deaneries, supporting the best distribution of existing resources and ways to access what is available. This is meant to build on the previous Action Planning process, which in some parishes continues while in others, like our own, has been pretty much lost or shelved.

It is important to understand that this is not about reducing the number of paid clergy posts, as Ely is expecting to be able to sustain the existing numbers into the foreseeable future. However, it may be that the existing clergy posts are redistributed where additional needs are identified in some places and others have reducing populations and opportunities for ministry.

The timing for us, in this season when we pray for Christian Unity is worth noting. Most important will be finding ways in which we can work together between parishes and benefices, and with other Christians of different denominations, in sharing resources which can benefit both the apparent givers and the apparent receivers in the sharing.

My favourite story illustrating this principle of mutual resourcing, which is one of the principles of the Kingdom of God, comes from China, and describes Heaven and Hell.

**Hell** is a place where there is an amazing feast laid on at the centre of a circle of seated people. Each person has their food in front of them, but it can only be eaten with chopsticks, and the chopsticks are all 6ft (2 meters) long, so no one can feed themselves and they are all hungry and frustrated.

**Heaven** is also a place where there is an amazing feast laid on at the centre of a circle of seated people. Each person still has their food in front of them, and again it can only be eaten with chopsticks, and the chopsticks are still all 6ft long. BUT this time the people are feeding each other, so they all enjoy both the feast and the joy of sharing.


# St. Hilary's Day
